# Researcher profile: Laura Justice

### Serving children with language impairment

Laura Justice knows all the right moves when it comes to winning grants. The professor in the School of Teaching and Learning has received \$11.2 million in awards since joining EHE in autumn 2007.

As a clinical speech-language pathologist and applied researcher in early childhood language and literacy development, communication disorders and educational interventions, much of her current funding is from the prestigious Institute of Education Sciences, U.S. Department of Education. She has also received grants from the American Speech-Language-Hearing Foundation, the International Reading Association and the National Institutes of Health, as well as a Fulbright Scholar Award. What's the key to her success?

Dr. David C. Morrison, co-founder of Grant Writers' Seminars and Workshops LLC, says success in grant writing comes from combining (1) an irresistible, fundable idea (2) that addresses a critical, recognized need, with (3) commitment to the grant-writing process. During Morrison's June '09 presentation at the college, he emphasized that ideas are frequently fundable when researchers expand on existing concepts, taking them in new and meaningful directions to solve a problem. If the problem is considered significant by the field and has society's attention, all

### Taking an existing concept in a new direction

Consider for example Justice's latest award from the Institute of Education Sciences, U.S. Department of Education, for "Speech Therapy Experiences in Primary Schools" (STEPS). The four-year, longitudinal study takes the need for high-quality speech/language therapy for children with disabilities in a direction that has never before

been studied.

The impetus for the proposal was Justice's realization that although she and fellow speech-language pathologists—120,000 of them in the U.S.—have fairly well developed infrastructures for working with children experiencing language impairments (LI), the extensive LI research contains little information about the effectiveness of services children receive.

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Justice partnered with Professor Steve Petrill, Department of Human Development and Family Science, to address the pressing need for research to guide decisions about how to structure language intervention in the schools. The STEPS study focuses on three characteristics of language intervention to determine what combinations work best for which children.

The \$2-million grant will follow 90 pathologists working with 400 kindergartners and first graders with LI. It is the first and largest study in the nation of children receiving speech/ language therapy services in public schools.

### Creating highly translational research: It's irresistibly fundable

Another angle to Justice's and Petrill's proposal boosted its appeal. The population of children in the study is made up of those actually receiving services in public schools. They are not idealized research subjects who meet strict criteria for inclusion.

"I've conducted criteria studies before," Justice says. "If you do research on idealized versions of children, how can you be sure the findings have validity for children actually being served? This is a fundamental issue in all biomedical research with study standards for inclusion."

In many of her studies, Justice uses the children being served without exclusions. "The result is that our work is so clearly aligned with practice, it has immediate and direct impact on what we do with children," she says. "In medicine, this is called bench to bedside research. It is very translational."

Justice is called upon weekly by groups across the nation and around the world to present her research and explain how it applies to practice. She has published 10 books on topics related to early intervention and has research relationships with other universities in the U.S. and around the world. Her popularity helps her infuse her findings into the mainstream of practice with SLPs, teachers and parents alike.

# Choosing a topic of significance to the many

Last but not least, Justice's field of choice receives significant attention from society, government and the field, which helps her proposals command attention. Language impairment is the most common reason that children receive special education services in our schools—7–10 percent of our public school population. As a result, the federal investment supporting this population of children is very large.

By helping children overcome LI, Justice and the Preschool Language and Literacy Lab team are making a vital contribution. "Language underlies everything in our society," Justice says. "It allows us to obtain work, communicate with others, and read. In short, it is key to everything."

**PLLL** is home to a variety of federally funded research projects concerning the

education of and intervention with children experiencing risk due to adverse environmental or developmental issues. Professor Laura Justice and her team partner with colleagues within the college, across the university, in the local and national community and around the world. She has a full-time director assigned to each research project.

## Beyond the Oval: Scholarly Recognition and Service







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**Chris Zirkle (PAES)** was appointed by the U.S. Department of Energy as an expert panel member for the review of grant applications focused on "Developing and Enhancing Workforce Training Programs for the Electric Power Sector."

The research of **Stephen Petrill (HDFS)** was showcased in the January 11, 2010 edition of *Research Communications*. His twin study, which appears online in the *Journal of Child Psychology and Psychiatry*, shows that environment plays a key role in developing reading skills which "supports the need for sustained efforts to promote reading development in children." The results give further evidence that children can make significant gains in reading during their early school years, beyond the genetic factors that influence reading ability.

**Lynley and Eric Anderman (ED P&L)** co-authored a book, Psychology of classroom learning: An encyclopedia, which was chosen by *Choice* magazine as one of their "Outstanding Academic Titles." This book was one of < 3% of the 25,000 submissions to *Choice* that was selected for this recognition.

Kathy Cabe Trundle (T&L) was selected as an author for an innovative new K-2 science education curriculum, which includes more than150 different books and incorporates inquiry investigations, emphasis on literacy skills, and vivid and compelling nature photographs, classic to *National Geographic*. She was one of four science educators invited to develop their first core science program because of the prominence of her research in early childhood science education and her leadership roles in the science education community. A curriculum for grades 3–5 in this series in under development and Dr. Trundle serves as an author.

**Sharon Seiling (CS)** is a founding member of eXtension's Financial Security for All Community of Practice, which offers consumers objective, peer-reviewed, research-based financial education and information on its Website, *extension.org*. She received the FDIC Chairman's Award for Innovation in Financial Education.

Arthur L. White (T&L) with 40+ years as professor of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics Education, received the School Science and Mathematics Association George G. Mallinson Distinguished Service Award.

It's About Discovery is a partnership between Ohio State, University of North Carolina at Greensboro and Fayetteville State University. **Dean Cristol**, Professor of Education at Ohio State-Lima, serves as Principal Investigator for an \$864K NSF grant to engage high school students and their teachers in critical thinking skills that focus on hands-on, inquiry-based learning experiences in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, or STEM, content areas. Dr. Cristol shared, "We are measuring whether the curriculum helps students acquire the necessary knowledge and attitudes about STEM careers to influence them to choose such an educational and career path."

The American Educational Research Association (AERA) honored six ED P&L faculty for the new fellows program for their research and development of research opportunities.

Bruce Tuckman and Anita Woolfolk Hoy were designated as Inaugural Fellows, while Wayne Hoy and Patricia Lather are 2009 Fellows. The AERA Class of 2010 selected Eric Anderman and Richard Lomax as Fellows of the AERA for their commitment to excellence in research and to emphasize to new scholars the importance of sustained research of excellence in the field.



### **Workshop Series Helps to Demystify the Federal Grant Review Process**

"Expectations for generating federal funding have increased dramatically at Ohio State and all other Research 1 institutions in recent years, causing greater competition for available funds. Developing a sound understanding of the grant review process is an effective strategy to assist researchers to increase the likelihood of success," according to Associate Dean for Research, Mark Failla.

The Office of Research is sponsoring a series of workshops titled, "Demystifying the federal grant review process." Each workshop focuses on a different federal agency whose mission covers the interests and expertise of many faculty in EHE, such as National Institutes of Health (NIH), Institute of Education Sciences (IES), United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the National Science Foundation (NSF).

> On Friday, February 5, Earl Harrison (HN) and Brian Focht (PAES) presented the first workshop in the series, focusing on NIH. Earl has had continuous NIH funding since 1983 and sits on the nutrition study section. Brian serves as an ad hoc member of a study section. More than 20 faculty and graduate students braved the inclement weather and appreciated hearing Earl's and

Laura has obtained \$11.2 M in active funding since 2007 and she has several projects funded through IES. Those in attendance (on another snowy day!) learned that in order for a proposal to receive funding

from IES, (1) a good idea has to have an impact on the success of children in the classroom, (2) senior faculty and experts can (and should) be added to lend weight and expertise to junior faculty proposals, either as co-PIs or as consultants, and (3) well developed methodology is as essential to getting funding as the initial good idea. #### Robert Scharff addresses cost of foodborne illness in the U.S.

Faculty and staff across the college appear in the media regularly. **Robert L. Scharff**, CS, was quoted in a record 328 news articles in two days in outlets such as ABC News.com, USAToday.com, Reuters.com and BusinessWeek.com. The frenzy was caused by his participation in a news teleconference on Tuesday, March 2, presented by The Produce Safety Project, an initiative of The Pew Charitable Trusts.

Scharff, who was formerly an economist with the Food and Drug Administration, wrote the peer-reviewed report discussed at the teleconference. He stated that "food-borne illnesses, such as E.

coli and salmonella, cost the United States \$152 billion annually in health care and other losses. This is four and one-half times higher than the \$35 billion cost reported by the Agriculture Department back in 1997."

The teleconference, which included U.S. Rep. Rosa DeLauro (D-CT) and Jim O'Hara, Director, Produce Safety Project, comes at a time when the U.S. Senate may soon vote on reform of the nation's food-safety oversight system through comprehensive food-safety legislation.
